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#### Description of the discipline

The course is designed to provide students with the necessary knowledge in the field of human rights protection, to form the theoretical basis of the modern human rights institution, the main conceptual approaches to understanding the nature of human rights, the genesis and historical forms of the institution's development. It is important for students to understand that human rights are the determining criterion that determines the content and direction of the state's activities, embodying the principle of the state's responsibility to the individual for its activities, and the establishment and enforcement of human rights and freedoms is the main duty of the state.

Particular attention is paid to international and European standards for the protection of human rights and freedoms, as well as Ukraine's international obligations in this area.

The aim of the course is to understand the main modern legal doctrines and values, to develop students' knowledge, skills and abilities in the field of human rights and freedoms protection and gender equality, to provide a holistic view of the concept of non-discrimination on any grounds as a fundamental value and legal standard of modern civil society.
