### **Description of the discipline**

Human rights and international crime is a special course that examines the basic concepts and connection between human rights, criminal law and international criminal justice. Particular attention is paid to the system of international cooperation in the fight against crime. The legal bases of the international criminal justice and activity of bodies of the international criminal justice are considered. The history of the International Criminal Court, the formation, development, structure and functions, and practice are of great importance in understanding the peculiarities of the functioning of these bodies. The international nature of transnational crime and the need to criminalize crime and criminal law in national law is a major challenge in the fight against transnational organized crime. This requires the elimination of differences in the legislation of different states, which exists despite all the similarities of domestic criminal law. There is also a need to harmonize criminal law and procedural elements in the legal systems of different states, in the ability to interact with each other, as well as with international criminal law.
